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A Message from the Quorum of Twelve Apostles

GET REAL!

A common expression, usually spoken when one or more persons in a discussion seem to be expressing ideas or holding to hopes and beliefs that are based in extreme unlikelihood. The strange fact is that anyone can have his own version of reality. One person's reality might seem complete fantasy to another.

How can that be? The dictionary definition of reality seems pretty straightforward:

- the quality or fact of being real
- · something that is real; fact
- the quality of being true to life

Basic understanding of natural reality relies upon our physical senses. Something is real to everyone who can see, touch, hear, taste, or smell it. At the next level, something we cannot see, touch, hear, taste, or smell—such as gravity—is real if, using those same five senses, we can witness its effects in some consistent way. Accordingly, starting in early childhood, each of us has developed a personal belief of reality from life experiences.

Another level of widely accepted reality is based on data and science, including mathematical calculations. These versions of reality are generally accepted for long periods of time, but they also are vulnerable to new discoveries and updated calculations that resolve defects found in previously theorized truths. (E.g., At a time in the past, the accepted reality was that the sun revolves around the earth.)

Society tends to accept that which arises out of currently available data and the prevailing conventions used for interpretation and calculation. An example of this is current conventional wisdom which accepts that it has been 13.8 billion years since the Big Bang. Note that, by far, the majority of people who accept this as reality cannot begin to expound on the various rules of physics and mathematics that are used to prove it. Nevertheless, it remains the commonly understood reality. (This writing is neither meant to support nor dispute this. That is an argument for another day.)

This brings us to another form of accepted reality which is based on what "everyone" else believes. This may be the most powerful version of truth and can be dangerous when influencers

Blast From The Past

One hundred and eighty-nine years ago this month, on September 14, 1835 the counsel of the church met in the unfinished Kirtland Temple and appointed Emma Smith to publish her hymnbook with William Phelps as publisher.

The project was begun in preparation for the dedication of the Kirtland temple. Emma's hymnal was finally typeset in 1835, the date of the imprint, but the run of 1,000 copies was printed in early 1836. Fredrick G. Williams owned the printing press. The book contained 90 hymn texts with no music, and cost one dollar. It was a small book—3 ½ by 4 inches, easily kept in the pocket for daily use. Instead of music the book offered metrical designation. The preface, most likely written by Emma, was as follows: "In order to sing by the Spirit, and with the understanding, it is necessary that the church of the Latter Day Saints should have a collection of 'Sacred Hymns,' adapted to their faith and belief in the gospel, and, as far as can be, holding forth the promises made to the fathers who died in the precious faith of a glorious resurrection, and a thousand years' reign on earth with the Son of Man in his glory.

ach time she goes back to Aliquippa, Candace's Pittsburgh accent returns (ex.: "you" becomes "younz"). We are all influenced by others, as the beautiful song, "For Good" (from the musical, "Wicked"), states, "Because I met you, I've been changed for the good." Holy Ghost" (Acts 2:2-4). Was this rushing mighty wind from Heaven God breathing His spirit out onto the Church? Is this what such a magnificent, divine transference from Heaven sounds like?

Peter explained the phenomenon, "This is that which was spoken by the prophet Joel...saith God, I will pour out OF my Spirit upon all flesh...and on my servants and on my handmaidens I will pour out in those days OF my Spirit" (Acts 2:16-18). Peter actually misquoted the prophet, with one of the single most important two-letter prepositions ever uttered. He did it twice, so this certainly was no accidental misstep. Peter's amendment of "OF," was wrong, yet so right. He had accurately captured the goings on in the upper room and on the Day of Pentecost perfectly: The Holy Spirit poured out OF Jesus Christ and then the Father, respectively!

Paul shows how this wonder is made available from within them to within you! "Know ye not that ye are the temple of God, and that the spirit dwelleth in you?" (1 Corinthians 3:16).

Prior to your baptism, the Holy Spirit visited you. Afterwards, a powerful change. Why is baptism necessary in advance of this change? Consider the first act in moving into your own physical dwelling place. You most likely cleaned it thoroughly, with a desire to begin fresh and healthy! However, when you visit your friends and/or family, you would never clean upon entering their home. Such accountability on your part in someone else's abode makes no sense; as it is with the Holy Ghost with us.

Once Jesus becomes your permanent commitment, you no longer represent a place for Him to simply visit, but to dwell. You are transformed into a "temple of God." So, you are washed clean and filled with His goodness. You now possess all you need to reach His intended potential for you. You are converted into a fully endorsed, Heavenly authorized representative of the Son of God. You are changed for the good. YOU ARE MORE THAN WHAT YOU WERE! Or as Candace and her fellow Pittsburghers might say, "Younz are more than what younz were!"

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persuade people to accept false realities, often using simple twists of the truth—additions and omissions—that fall favorably upon itching ears. Disciples of these influencers tend to persuade others until significant segments of society accept a false reality just because so many others seem to accept it. History is replete with examples of this kind of false reality and the damage that can be done. Extreme manifestations of this were seen in nazism and various racist practices that have prevailed in segments of society. As the Apostle Paul prophesied, the Apostasy sprung out of such distortion of truth. (See 2 Timothy 4:3-4.)

Examining this last form of reality, we ought to recognize the great overlap between our perceptions of natural reality and spiritual reality. In fact, there is only one reality: In the beginning God created...and God saw everything that He had made, and behold, it was very good (Genesis 1:1-31). From the most basic fact discerned by our physical senses to the most elegant theory backed only by sparse data and complex calculations, all of natural reality is merely a subset of God's reality. Although we tend to be profoundly confident in the nature of things (natural reality), everything is subordinate to the will of God. As Moses stood amazed before the bush that burned continuously without being consumed, he enquired as to the identity of the voice that called out and instructed him, and the Lord answered: I AM THAT I AM (Exodus 3:2-15).

At another time and place, from the midst of impenetrable darkness which covered this land for three days upon His crucifixion, Jesus introduced Himself to the Nephites: Behold, I am Jesus Christ the Son of God. I created the heavens and the earth, and all things that in them are. I was with the Father from the beginning. I am in the Father, and the Father in me; and in me hath the Father glorified His name...I am the light and life of the world. I am Alpha and Omega, the beginning and the end (3 Nephi 9:15-18).

God made all the rules of nature, and He supersedes them whenever He wants to. We know this, but it is no small thing to maintain within our hearts and minds the reality that is God's truth. Peter, as he actually walked on water, struggled to dwell within that level of reality which empowered him to do so. The boisterous sea drew his mind back into the boundaries of natural reality; dominated by fear, he could not continue to believe, and he began to sink. Note that, even with his diminished faith, he still called on Jesus to save him, and Jesus, while catching him, admonished: "O thou of little faith, wherefore didst thou doubt?" (Matthew 14:22-33)

It is clear that faith is not just a yes or no, but a matter of how much the mind of Christ dominates the carnal mind within each of us (1 Corinthians 2:16). It is our faith or lack thereof that determines each of our personal versions of reality.

In other words, what we believe or how completely we believe in Christ determines how closely our perception of what is real matches the Lord's truth.

Faith being the key, Alma laid out a wonderful template to follow in order to develop faith from just a desire to believe until continuous nourishment of the word of God within us takes root and grows like a tree springing up to everlasting life (Alma 32). One of the implications of this chapter is that we should not be satisfied with reaching the next level of belief/faith, but rather regard each step upward in faith as having acquired new knowledge (something discernable, a reality), a solid basis from which to aspire to the next level.

Perfection being the goal, Paul wrote to the Philippians: "Not as though I had already attained, either were already perfect: but I follow after,...forgetting those things which are behind, and reaching forth unto those things which are before, I press toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus" (Philippians 3:12-14).

It is this engagement, this faithful desire and pursuit of greater alignment with the Lord, that enables us to envision our salvation and the fulfillment of God's promises as part of our own spiritually enhanced reality. What level can we aspire to? Well, remember the Brother of Jared asking for the Lord's touch upon the stones he had prepared, God said: "... never has man come before me with such exceeding faith as thou hast; for were it not so ye could not have seen my finger..." (Ether 2:9).

Brothers, Sisters, and friends, we live in an era of time that has been prophesied. Although we cannot pinpoint precisely where we are in the timing of God's plan, we know we are very much closer to fulfillment than were those of whom we read in scriptures. Moreover, we are actually witnessing many elements in the sequence of events prophesied in God's word, and He has been generous with dreams and revelations encouraging us to prepare our hearts right now.

Our June Apostles' meeting was blessed with manifestations of the Spirit of God providing clear direction for the Church which the Apostles embraced thankfully for immediate follow up. Like the "cloud of witnesses" in the eleventh chapter of Hebrews, we have every reason to be living the life of the believers. Rather than being bound by the limits of natural understanding, they received a good report through their faith. Despite not having received the promises during their natural lifetimes, their reality was aligned with God's such that they were able to see those promises afar off (Hebrews 11). "Wherefore...let us run with patience the race that is set before us, looking unto Jesus, the author and finisher of our faith" (Hebrews 12:1-2).

All in God's Wisdom

he Gospel according to Luke states:

And he [Jesus] taught in their synagogues, being glorified of all. And he came to Nazareth, where he had been brought up: and, as his custom was, he went into the synagogue on the sabbath day, and stood up to read.

And there was delivered unto him the book of the prophet Esaias [Isaiah] and when he had opened the book, he found the place where it was written, "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he hath anointed me to preach the gospel to the poor; he hath sent me to heal the brokenhearted, to preach deliverance to the captives, and recovering of sight to the blind, to set at liberty them that are bruised, To preach the acceptable year of the Lord" [Isaiah 61:1-3]. And he closed the book, and he gave it again to the minister, and sat down. And the eyes of all of them that were in the synagogue were fastened on him. And he began to say unto them, "This day is this scripture fulfilled in your ears" (Luke 4:15–21).

It was my understanding that during Jesus' ministry a portion (parshah) of the Torah (first five books of the Old Testament) was read each week in local synagogues. But Jesus, who was beginning his ministry in the Nazareth synagogue, was handed the prophet Isaiah scroll to read instead of the Torah scroll. Why?

I questioned a Jewish friend of mine and asked him if there is a time when the Torah reading was not used. His answer was that the Torah is always read, but there is a second reading, known as the Haftarah. This reading came from a collection of scriptures selected by Jewish sages during a time of Greek-Persian oppression when the Torah was forbidden to be read publicly. Usually, the Haftarah is related to the Torah reading of the week. People are selected, or they volunteer to read, such as with Jesus.

In God's wisdom, Jesus read the Haftarah for that sabbath service which included Isaiah 65:1-3. He knew what day to volunteer to read the Haftarah that explained His ministry. So, it was not coincidental that the Isaiah scroll was handed to Jesus instead of the scheduled Torah scroll for the standard reading. My friend stated, "In the synagogue service, Haftarah means "Concluding Portion" and the practice of reading the Haftarah has continued over the centuries even until today."

The Haftarah with Isaiah chapter 65 usually is read in September or October on the Jewish calendar. The underlying Torah reading is the third chapter of Genesis, where Adam and Eve's expulsion from the Garden of Eden is recorded.

So, what does all this mean to us? It was no coincidence that Jesus was handed the Isaiah scroll in the synagogue on the day he was announcing the start of his ministry in Nazareth. Note the phrases used by Isaiah (and Jesus): preach good tidings to the meek, bind the brokenhearted, proclaim liberty, opening of the prison, comfort all that mourn, give beauty for ashes and oil of joy for mourning, and the garment of praise for the spirit of heaviness. That they might be called trees of righteousness. (See Songs of Zion #65.)

Coincidence? Hardly! "But behold, all things have been done in the wisdom of him who knoweth all things." (2 Nephi 2:24)

hese beautiful words are the second verse of "The Ladies' Uplift Circle Song," written by Sister Amy Martin and the music by Sister Mabel Bickerton, for the twenty-fifth anniversary of the General Ladies' Uplift Circle.

Recently Sister Donna Bogle found the book, "Experiences Yesterday and Today," published by the Ladies' Uplift Circle of the Church of Jesus Christ. As I looked through it, I realized how many amazingly talented women we have had in the Church, yesterday and today. I have seen women organize fellowship weekends, develop interesting weekly lessons and devotions that stir our hearts with the word of God, create unique fundraisers and teach children how to live for Jesus through interactive games, crafts, and especially music.

"Experiences Yesterday and Today" is full of beautiful songs and the testimonies that inspired their writing. In the foreword of the book is written that "We, the Sisters of the Ladies' Uplift Circle feel that the hymns and intimate stories are so valuable, they should be preserved." In 1980, the book came together and was printed by The Church of Jesus Christ Print House. The following are a few excerpts from the book.

One of my favorite songs was written by Sister Sadie Cadman for a Christmas program for the young people in Monongahela, PA. Many of the common Christmas carols fit the New Testament scriptures she had for the program, but there were no songs to follow the Book of Mormon scriptures. To fulfill that need, she wrote and composed the music for "The New Star," as found in 3 Nephi.

Also in the book was an experience by Sister Carmella Mazzeo. She and her husband were experiencing a difficult year. Sister Carmella was fasting one day and was carried away in the Spirit. She was being lifted up toward heaven and could see the profile of God in the distance. She reached out to touch His face, knowing if she could touch Him, He would help them. Then finding herself on her knees, she unconsciously wrote the words to the song, "Wonderful Promises," the words which correspond to 2 Peter 1:4. One morning while doing her housework, Sister Virginia Pizzaia was inspired to write a song. "The words came one after another until I had written four verses. 'No Other One, But Jesus' seemed to be the answer to all my questions," she wrote in her testimony.

For several weeks the ministry preached on the theme, laying up your treasures in heaven and preparing to meet the Lord (Matthew, chapter 6). Their words, "There are treasures untold for man to behold," stayed with Sister Nancy Harvey and one day she was directed to write "Treasures Untold."

There are treasures untold for man to behold,
Of Jesus and His wonderful love;
How he came down to earth—of the wonderful birth,

Sister Nancy stated that she wasn't a poet, but, as we know, with God, all things are possible.

Sister Esther Dyer was thinking one day about how she could teach her Sunday School Class, ages nine to thirteen, the Restoration and Joseph Smith. Repetition came to her as an effective way to learn and at the same time, the chorus to "Hallelujah, The Gospel Is Restored." The children learned the words and tune of the chorus very well. With a little prodding by her father and as an answer to prayer, she composed the rest of the verses as we sing it today.

Days before a district conference, Sister Arlene Buffington

heard the Spirit speak the words "An Era Such As Never Known." She wrote them on a piece of paper and laid them on her piano. Ten days later, on her way to the conference, the melody of the song came to her. She prayed that the Lord would allow her to remember it. The next day, after finding the piece of paper on the piano, the melody again was given to her, and the song was written. This is only a sample of the beautiful experience concerning this song. You will find the rest of the experience on page #111 of "Experiences Yesterday and Today."

I only wrote a small part of each experience. There is much more to read about each one. There will be treasures untold that we may be privileged to see in the future, but until then, we have treasures from yesterday to be discovered today found in the literature of The Church of Jesus Christ.

Do you remember someone praying for you and you were healed? Or being in a car accident and not dying? How about the last time you were really scared or worried about something you must do, or a big change in your life and you prayed? Or have you ever been afraid of a bad person or bully? Remember, those of us who follow the Lord, who trust in Him and pray to Him, have Him as our Secret Weapon! He will protect us, guide us, keep us safe, and even send angels to help us.

Scriptures say "Jesus Christ is the same, yesterday, today and forever!" (See Hebrew 13:8.) That especially means the Lord is there for us also in times of trouble. Tomorrow, go down against them: behold, they come up over by the cliff of Ziz. You will find them at the end of the brook, by the wilderness."

And he continued, "You will not need to fight in this battle. Set yourselves, stand still and see the salvation of the Lord with you! Do not be dismayed! Fear not. Tomorrow go out against those armies, for the Lord will be with you!" (See II Chronicles Chapter 20.)
